What core vocabulary would need to be explored and taught?	<i>comfortably, baking, vegetables, 'downright bad', 'In fact', 'piped up', 'pursed his lips', whistled, proper, prove, unfamiliar, 'I suppose so', celebration.</i>
What background knowledge could support children to make deeper connections?	<i>Other traditional tales that have wolves in them e.g., Three Little Pigs, Little Red Riding Hood, knowledge about real wolves, woodland settings What knitting is.</i>
What is the potential challenge of the text? <i>E.g., grammar, sentence construction, etc.</i>	<i>Use of questions and exclamations Direct speech and speech verbs. Use of Ellipses. Capitalised words and italics for emphasis.</i>
What is the underlying structure or pattern?	<i>Narrative picture book - some of the story told through pictures.</i> <i>Basic pattern:</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>• Good Wolf introduced.</i> <i>• Good Wolf meets Bad Wolf.</i> <i>• Bad Wolf tries to change Good Wolf.</i> <i>• Good Wolf tries to be a real wolf.</i> <i>• Good Wolf changes but attacks Bad Wolf.</i> <i>• Bad Wolf changes and makes a promise to be good.</i> <i>• Bad Wolf breaks promise.</i>
